

Administrative Board of Trustees Meeting Minutes

Date: April 12, 2021 Location: Attala County Library

Time: 10:00 am

A regularly scheduled meeting of the Mid-Mississippi Regional Library System Board of Trustees was held on Monday, April 12, 2021, at the Attala County Library. Trustees in attendance were: Rhonda Porter, Winston County (teleconference), Martha Ramzy, Leake County (teleconference), Flora Pilgrim, Holmes County (teleconference), Margaret Harris, Montgomery County (teleconference), and Terry Jones, Attala County (teleconference). Also in attendance were staff members: Nancy Cain, Carthage-Leake County Librarian; Tammy Bell, System Business Manager; and Josh Haidet, System Executive Director.

CALL TO ORDER...

Rhonda Porter, Board Chair, called the meeting to order.

SETTING THE AGENDA...

Mrs. Porter asked if there were any additions to the agenda. As there were none, the agenda was set.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES...

Mrs. Porter asked if there were any additions or revisions to the January 25, 2021 board meeting minutes. There were none. Terry Jones made a motion to approve the minutes of the meeting as presented. Flora Pilgrim seconded, and all were in favor.

PUBLIC COMMENTS...

Mrs. Porter asked if there were any public comments. There were none.

REPORTS...

A. Librarian's Report: Nancy Cain, Carthage-Leake County Librarian (See attached report)

B. Financial Report - Tammy Bell, MMRLS Business Manager

Martha Ramzy made a motion to approve the financial report, and Margaret Harris seconded. All were in favor.

C. Director's Report – Josh Haidet, MMRLS Executive Director (See attached director's report)

DISCUSSION ITEMS...

A. Security Gates

Director Josh Haidet reported that the system's security gates were nearing the end of their functional life. The gate at the Durant Public Library had been removed recently because it has stopped working. Due to flooring work at the Attala County Library, a gate was removed at that location. It was the director's intention not to replace these gates and periodically remove other gates as needed or as requested by the librarian. Mr. Haidet mentioned that he didn't feel the gates were an effective means to prevent theft, that securing each new book cost a significant amount of money in staff time per year, and that they were generally eyesores and in the way. After the discussion, there were no objections to the director's plan of action.

NEW BUSINESS...

A. Board Attorney

Flora Pilgrim made a motion to enter Executive Session to discuss hiring a board attorney for the system. Martha Ramzy seconded, and all were in favor.

Upon returning from the executive session, Flora Pilgrim motioned to retain Carey R. Varnado of Montague, Pittman, and Varnado in Hattiesburg Mississippi as the system's board attorney at the hourly rate of \$225 and \$.50 per mile reimbursement for travel expenses. Martha Ramzy seconded, and all were in favor.

B. System Signage

The board next discussed the purchase of new outdoor signs for eight branch locations throughout the system to add signs or replace existing signs that were in poor condition, and which featured the old library logo. The system received three bids to complete the work. Flora Pilgrim motioned to accept the bid from Fast Signs located in Hattiesburg, Mississippi, for \$7,247.94. Martha Ramzy seconded, and all were in favor.

C. Carthage Furniture

The board next discussed new furniture for the Carthage-Leake County Library. Following a library reset, a new computer desk was needed, and Library Interiors suggested additional furniture. The total quote based on state contract pricing was \$36,363.97. Flora Pilgrim made a motion to set a total budget for the project at \$45,000.00, and Terry Jones seconded. All were in favor.

ADJOURNMENT...

Board Chair Rhonda Porter asked if there was any further discussion needed before the meeting was adjourned. As there was none, Terry Jones motioned to adjourn the meeting, and Martha Ramzy seconded. All were in favor.

Librarian's Report, Nancy Cain

The library is now more open and inviting for visitors. During the month of January, headquarters staff came into the Carthage Library and worked very hard to give us a more open and inviting floorplan. The non-fiction shelves and books have been moved where the computers previously were. The computers are now closer to the back door that is adjacent to our parking lot. Due to these changes in the arrangement of the books and computers, the library is much more open and spacious. Guests are now able to browse the stacks for the books they want for the first time since last March when the pandemic started. Library staff continues to monitor the number of guests in the library to make sure that we don't have more than 12-15 in the library at one time. We currently will allow up to 3 people in the children's room to browse the children's collection. We allow 3 to 4 people to browse the adult non-fiction/ fiction area at a time. We continue to require a mask for anyone entering the library, and if someone wants to browse the books, we ask them to sanitize their hands. If a book is touched and not checked out, we ask the guest to place the book on a cart so that it can be sanitized.






February Programs

Star Library FY2019

- MMRLS has been named a FY2019 Mississippi Star Library by the Mississippi Library Commission.
- This is the first time the system has received this award.
- The Mississippi Star Library award is given to libraries with outstanding statistical performance in a several categories, including the number of registered users, items circulated, program attendance, public computer and internet usage, database use, books lent throughout the state, and items withdrawn.

Overdue Fine Update

- MMRLS officially eliminated the collection of overdue fines at the end of January 2021.
- All previous overdue fines were waived soon thereafter by Anita Winger at Mississippi State.
- All necessary policy changes are being completed to bring them up to date.
- The staff and public reaction have been positive. The official public announcement of this change was made at the beginning of April to coincide with National Library Week.

Staffing Changes

- Duck Hill Librarian Jessie Mann retired in early December after 11 years of service to MMRLS. Former Winona Assistant Librarian Dina Kilburn took over the role, with Winona Clerk Blair Caldwell taking over the Winona Assistant Librarian position.
- Pickens Librarian Maureen Thompson resigned her position effective February 12th. Tiffany Washington, a library user and resident of Pickens with a background in early childhood education, has been hired to fill the position.
- Walnut Grove Saturday Librarian/Substitute Librarian Brandi Ingle is resigning her position effective April 17th. Current Walnut Grove Substitute Candice Grayson will be taking over beginning April 24th.
- Tchula and West Librarian Ann Polk has informed us she will be retiring in June. The search for her replacement will begin in May.

Employee Handbook Work Progressing

I am working on a complete revision of the MMRLS Employee Handbook to bring the system up
to date with current employment law. I plan to have a draft of the handbook before the board for
its review at the August or October meeting, depending on the agendas for those meetings, and
the progress on the handbook.

Time Clocks

- MMRLS recently purchased a time clock for the Attala County Library and Headquarters
 personnel. We'll be testing the functionality of the time clock for use throughout the system.
- We have been informed by MLC that all employees, even those who are salaried employees, should complete a time sheet. This appears to the easiest way to accomplish this goal.

Branch Updates

 All branch locations are now "fully open" for browsing to the public. All libraries will resume their normal hours of operation no later than May 1st. A few libraries may have slightly different hours of operation if the potential for better staff usage is present, as I feel now would be a good time to make those changes if necessary.

Attala County

- The leaks continue at the Attala County Library, and specifically in the new children's area. The most recent thing we have been told is that the county is preparing to coat the roof with a rubber sealant in the hopes that this will temporarily stop leaks.
- Termites are still present in the building and have started to swarm since the warm weather has returned. Exterminators have been on-site but tell us there isn't much they can do since the pests are living in the roof.
- Attala County Board of Supervisor Chairperson Tim Pinkard has been updated on the status of the roof several times this year already. He does recognize that a new roof is required, but due to the significant financial cost involved, a time frame for this to occur is uncertain.
- The order for the library's new shelving and end caps has been placed. The order for the children's area canopy tops has been put on hold due to the aforementioned leaks.
- Work on the new computer lab has been slow due to several factors but is finally progressing.
 The Attala County Friends of the Library have agreed to replace the worn-out carpeting in the lab with a new vinyl planking floor. Work should begin on April 12th.
- Our IT Coordinator Michael Davide has recently completed the network cable wiring for the computers, and county workers completed the necessary electrical work in February.
- The library was able to pay a contractor to have the room painted, and that work was below our capitol improvement threshold. A new circulation desk for the area has been ordered.
- We are targeting an opening of May 1^{st} for the new computer lab.

Holmes County

• Roof leaks continue at Durant and Tchula. I was able to speak to a maintenance man for the City of Durant in late March, and he said he was working on getting a roofer to come and fix the leak.

Leake County

• The Walnut Grove Public Library is in need of some new shelving. After projects are completed at Attala and Carthage, we'll be exploring options to order shelving for this library.

Montgomery County

- The Duck Hill Public Library's hours were recently changed. The change allows for the library to be open 4 more hours during the week on Wednesday afternoon, and eliminates Saturday hours.
- A new DVD shelf was recently installed in Duck Hill (see picture below).
- A reset of the Winona-Montgomery County Library children's area has recently been completed. The reset allows for a more open space at the front of the library, and for staff to be able to easily view the entire area from the circulation desk.
- Work has also begun on the clean out of the library, and the organization of their genealogy collection.
- The Winona-Montgomery is in need of new end panels similar to what was ordered for the Attala County Library. We'll be exploring this option in the future.















Winston County

As part of our plan to again allow patrons to browse all library collections, the Winston County
Library now has a staff workstation between the children's and fiction areas. Staff can check out
books at this location and provide more immediate assistance to patrons browsing the stacks in
the rear of the library building.
